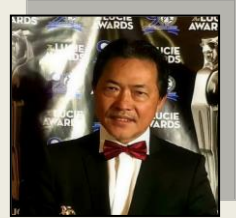

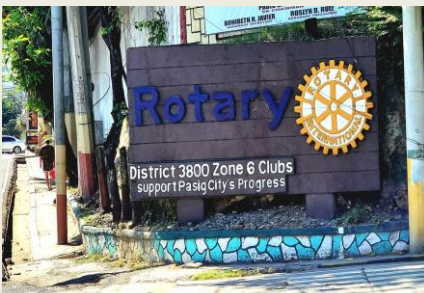

## ROTARY PROJECTS AROUND THE GLOBE *February 2022*

### United States

While jogging on Memorial Day weekend in 2020, Patrick Shairs discovered a holiday-appropriate spot for a break: the old City Cemetery in his hometown of Franklin, Tennessee. Shairs, a member of the Rotary Club of Downtown Franklin, was dismayed by the multitude of badly stained and unreadable headstones. That fall, the club started a project to restore several historic cemeteries in the area. About a year later, 127 volunteers, including members from other area Rotary clubs and students from local schools, had cleaned 560 headstones and footstones and 140 plot pillars, using brushes and spray bottles filled with a biological solution recommended by a preservation organization. They identified 81 people buried in one cemetery who were not listed in the town's official burial register, something that would have gone undiscovered if not for their efforts.

### Canada

Island Park in Portage La Prairie, Manitoba, has been a meeting place for more than 100 years. In 2019, the Rotary Club of Portage La Prairie outlined a strategy for a phased, \$150,000 effort to revitalize an area within the popular lakefront park, where the club also sponsored a disc golf course. "The club felt that we could rejuvenate the duck pond to its old glory as well as add new features," says club member Preston Meier. Since 2020, the club has redesigned and rebuilt a waterfall, added fencing and lighting, and constructed a deck with a pergola for special events. "We wanted a project that we could get our hands dirty in and have our

fingerprints on — a little blood, sweat, and tears in addition to the fundraising,” Meier says.

### **England**

After a pandemic-induced hiatus, an annual dragon boat race sponsored by the Rotary Club of Skipton lured more than 150 enthusiastic paddlers in September. Thirteen teams — with sobriquets such as the Komodo Dragons, Craven Ravens, and Rainbow Rockets — collected pledges and raised about \$17,000 for the competitors’ chosen charities. Club member Andrew Gold noted that the competitions in 2018 and 2019 had raised a combined \$30,000. The event was conceived by 2017-18 Club President Mark Ludlam as a tribute to his late father, Brian, a past club president who had arranged a dragon boat race. About half of the club’s 40 members helped steward the 200-meter race.

### **India**

More than 250 youths from schools and Interact clubs across several Indian states put paint and crayons to paper in a poster competition sponsored by the all-female Rotary Club of Ahmednagar Priyadarshini. The Freedom from Polio art contest stressed the “importance of taking polio drops to help our world get freedom from polio forever,” says Bindu Shirsath, a club member who was among the five judges. The club recruited district PolioPlus committee chairs and tapped Facebook and WhatsApp groups to publicize the inaugural project. “Since it was an online competition, the club did not incur costs except for making the e-certificate for winners and publicizing the results in local newspapers,” Shirsath adds, resulting in an affordable way to conjure creativity with a message.

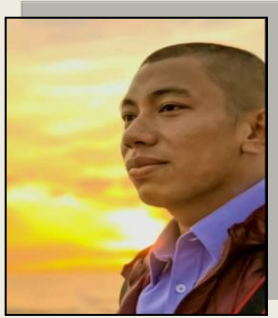

### **Philippines**

Mangroves form an integral part of the coastal ecosystem of the Philippines. They serve as a source of medicines, alcohol, and timber; a haven for coral reef fish; and a buffer against typhoons. In a two-pronged effort to shore up the maritime trees and buttress a fishing village's ecotourism drive, in November the Rotary Club of Bacolod-Marapara teamed with the Rotary Club of Victorias, the Rotaract Club of Marapara, the Pasil Fisherfolks Association, and other local organizations. They planted some 1,000 mangrove seedlings and provided the fishers with bamboo to construct two cottages in the native style for rental to tourists. "Around the world, mangroves are threatened, but they are important," says Rolando Corona, president of the Bacolod-Marapara club. "Their protection and restoration should be a high priority."

**KARLOS MANLUPIG**

***JOURNALIST / VISUAL STORY TELLER / PEACEBUILDER***

Karlos Manlupig is a journalist who covers the different conflicts and peace processes in the Philippines. He writes about politics, environment and human rights for the Philippine Daily Inquirer. His reportage on peace and conflict includes topics related to the Communist Party of the Philippines (CPP), Moro Islamic Liberation Front (MILF), Moro National Liberation Front (MNLF) and Bangsamoro Islamic Freedom Fighters (BIFF). Manlupig also documented the growth of small but extremely capable ISIS-inspired groups in the country.

As a peacebuilder, Manlupig is the Director for Project Development and Resource Mobilization of Balay Mindanaw Foundation, Inc. He also works with Balay Mindanaw's International Center for Peace, which focuses in the strengthening of safe and inclusive spaces for dialogue in Mindanao. The team directly engages with armed revolutionary organizations especially the New People's Army and MILF to provide support for the peace processes. The objective is to bring the peace process closer to the people and the people closer to the peace process.

Manlupig was initially invited to the Government of the Republic of the Philippines-National Democratic Front peace talks as a

journalist but was eventually invited as a resource person by both Parties in the formal negotiations.

As a trainer, Manlupig facilitated capacity building on Conflict Transformative Journalism for media practitioners and civil society organizations in the Philippines and Myanmar. He also provided trainings on peace messaging and non-violent communications for armed organizations engaged in different peace negotiations in Southeast Asia.

He earned his master's degree in Applied Conflict Transformation Studies from the Pannasastra University of Cambodia in 2016. Manlupig also completed his coursework for a master's degree in Clinical Psychology at the Ateneo de Davao University.

## FOOD FOR THOUGHT

-Is it spelled “whiskey” or “whisky”? Actually, it is spelled both ways. Irish and American whiskey are spelled with an e; Scotch and Canadian whisky without one.

- You know that feeling when you’re trying to find the perfect word, but can’t think of it? The technical name for that is *lethologica*. (Now don’t forget.)
- Between or Among? Technically speaking, “between” is used to set off two, and only two, things; “among” is used to set off three or more things.
- As far as choosing between “between” and “in between” when describing where an object is located, both can be grammatically correct, so use the one that is less awkward. (There is no such word as “inbetween.”)
- The largest pearl ever found is the Pearl of Lao-tze, which weighed 14 pounds, 1 ounce (6.37 kg). It was found in a giant clam off the Philippine island of Palawan in 1934.

-What is the largest country with just one time zone? China. It had five until 1949, when the new Communist regime reduced it to one. That means that on a given day, “solar noon,” when the sun is at its zenith, can arrive before 12:00 noon in Shanghai, in the far east of the country, and after 3 p.m. at the Tajikistan border, in the far west.

- The term for the growling or rumbling sound your stomach makes: *borborygmus*. It’s actually by fluid and gas moving in the intestines, not in the stomach. *Borborygmus* is an

- *onomatopoeic* word, meaning it was formed by imitating what it attempts to describe.
- To keep dairy products fresher longer, store them at the back of the refrigerator where it's coolest.
- Five popular foods that contain trace amounts of cyanide: cassava root, sorghum, spinach, almonds and lima beans.
- Further or Farther? When speaking of a measurable distance in physical space, use "farther"; when you want to express an addition to an abstract concept, use "further."
- Hung or Hanged? "Hung" is the past tense of "hang" in every case save one – the act of putting someone to death by hanging. In that case, the past tense of hang is "hanged."
- The difference between Elevation and Altitude? Generally, elevation is used to describe how far a point *on land* is above sea level; altitude is used to describe how far a point *in the air* is above sea level.
- Fewer or Less? "Fewer" denotes a specific amount of something countable; "less" denotes a general amount of something not countable.
- Stalactites and Stalagmites? Both are *speleothems*, mineral deposits that form inside caves. Stalactites resemble icicles and extend down from a ceiling or overhang; stalagmites extend up from the floor. An easy way to remember which is which: Stalactite, with a **c**, comes from the ceiling.

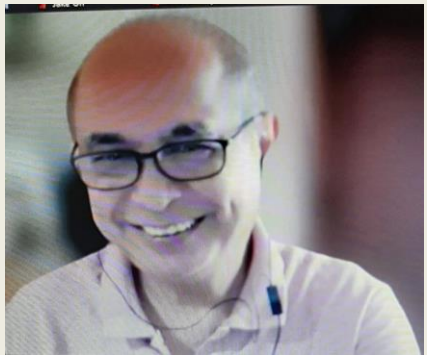

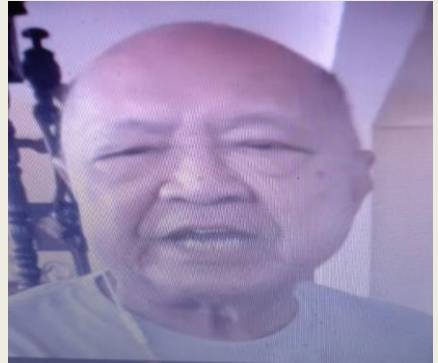
