A few days ago, I came across an article about Mateo Armando Tenao Caparas; yes, the beloved first RI President fondly called Mat. Last Monday, in the Inquirer column of former CJ Art Panganiban, he wrote of a good doctor who up to the end manifested his innocence to a charge of malpractice of medicine. ROTARY PROJECTS AROUND THE GLOBE

November 2023

United States

After a 2021 tornado and subsequent electrical fire damaged the African American Museum in Bowling Green, Kentucky, a Rotary club in the city acquired a \$10,000 disaster relief grant from District 6710 to help restore the museum. But “we didn’t just want to be handing out the check,” says Vickie Elrod, a past president of the Rotary Club of Bowling Green. “We wanted to get boots on the ground to get involved with the preservation of those artifacts.” About a dozen Rotarians attended workshops on archiving, and the club is assisting the museum in digitizing documents. They include records on Shake Rag, a once-vibrant district settled by former slaves and soldiers who fought for the Union in the Civil War. The financial assistance enabled the museum to work with a conservator on preserving its uniforms and other clothes. The museum reopened in August, and Rotarians continue to assist with cleaning damaged artifacts, pictures, and equipment.

Jamaica

Advocates in Jamaica highlight a shortage of housing that meets the needs of people with limited mobility. The Rotary Club of Kingston funded a nearly \$23,000 refurbishment of Cheshire Village, a transitional housing facility associated with a rehabilitation center. “Rotarians were instrumental and involved in the three town halls we had with residents,” says Karsten

Johnson, the club's immediate past president. "Our plans were made based on their priorities." The Kingston club, supported by donations from the Rotary Club of Naples North, Florida, raised the height of toilets and added support bars and railings along restroom walls. The club installed new kitchen cupboards, sinks, and faucets to improve accessibility for people who use wheelchairs. A first phase, to install six solar streetlights, was completed in February, with the retrofit finished in June.

Portugal

The Rotary Club of Almancil International takes an active approach in its mission to serve children, notably those with autism spectrum disorders or Down syndrome. Members sponsor activities including surfing lessons and animal therapy. In June the club unveiled a sensory room at a school to serve students ages 5 to 16. "The room is now complete, with state-of-the-art equipment including a soothing waterbed, music, and many sensory light and tactile objects," says club member Peter Hinze, who coordinated the project. "[It] can provide a sense of calm and help improve [students'] visual and auditory skills and help regulate their behavior." The project cost more than \$16,000. The club provided

Belgium

The Rotary Club of Virton en Gaume organized two days of concerts to celebrate the 10th anniversary of the Coralpins Gaumais, a trio that plays the traditional alphorn, a wooden horn once used by shepherds in the Alps. More than 140 alphornists, flag throwers, and bell ringers in folk costume participated in the event in May. The event raised money for the

club's charitable causes. The alphorn was the ideal instrument for harmoniously bringing together nature and the people who live in the region, says Jean-Marie Henin, a past club president. The club was inspired to put on the concert series after it organized visits by the Coralpains Gaumais to nursing homes and other care facilities during the COVID-19 pandemic.

MR. SHERWIN A. LAO

Sherwin A. Lao was born and raised in Metro Manila, Philippines. After graduating at Ateneo de Manila University with a degree in BS Management Economics, Sherwin embarked into the fast paced world of corporate life, landing several marketing jobs, with both multi-national companies as well as big local conglomerates. He reached his first managerial position at a young age of 22, and since then, had held key managerial positions in marketing for many companies.

Being young, aggressive and always seeking bigger challenges back then, Sherwin had gone through almost as many companies in as many years of work experience. Sherwin was involved in consumer marketing the whole time, ranging from snack food, milk, soft drinks, to throat drops, but nothing would fascinate him more than wine.

Towards the latter part of the 1990s, Sherwin got his first international assignment when he joined E&J Gallo Winery, the world's largest private winery based in California. Sherwin started as the Southeast Asian Manager in charge of On-Premise accounts, but after a year, he was promoted to Asia-Pacific Marketing Manager for On-Premise and for Gallo Fine Wines. He then moved to Hong Kong, and his markets would

eventually include Hong Kong, Taiwan, South Korea, China, as well as Thailand, Malaysia, Singapore and Philippines.

To prepare for the assignment, Sherwin went through several wine courses at the Gallo Wine Institute. Gallo Wine Institute is the in-house wine training facility of E&J Gallo Winery, and is still at present, considered the best training ground for wine personnel in North America. In fact, many Gallo alumni are among the most influential wine people in the US wine industry, holding key positions in some of the biggest US wineries.

Sherwin left E&J Gallo at the start of the new millennium, but wine was no longer just a profession, but a passion. Sherwin would continue to hone his wine talent by being involved in the local wine industry. He took on a few Manila-based jobs, including stints as General Manager of The Wine Company, a division of Premier Wine & Spirits, Inc., President of The Hunter Valley Wine Society of Philippines & Taiwan, and Marketing Director for Rustans Wine & Spirits, Inc.. Sherwin also traveled extensively to wine countries from Australia, New Zealand, North America, Europe to South Africa – drinking and learning wine along the way. Sherwin's genuine knowledge of wines and his affable character make him one of the most recognized local wine experts in the country. He is also a much sought after wine speaker and has conducted several wine seminars for leading corporations, including the Jollibee Group of Companies, HSBC Red Card, Pfizer, TNT, Marks & Spencer to name a few. In 2006, Sherwin wrote and published a wine book entitled 'Why Wine, Why Not?'.

Sherwin now co-owns a wine importation & distribution company, Golden Wines, Inc. and does Asian wine consultancy when called upon. Sherwin also writes the first and only regular wine column in the Philippines for Business World, aside from being a contributing writer to Hospitality News Philippines Magazine and the High Life. In 2010, Sherwin became the first Filipino member of the Bordeaux based Federation Internationale des Journalistes et Ecrivains des Vins et Spiritueux (FIJEV) or the international federation of wine writers. And in 2018, Sherwin also became the first and only Southeast Asian member of the London based Circle of Wine Writers (CWW). Sherwin had also judged wines in South Africa, Italy and Singapore.
